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

HAUNTED: motifs of dwelling, in Merleau-Ponty, Antonioni and Bresson BrendanPrendeville



In his essay 'Eye and Mind', the philosopher Maurice Merleau-Ponty writes of the "others"...... who haunt me and whom I haunt, with whom I haunt a single and actual Being, a present...' Brendan will discuss this concept of 'haunting' in relation to Merleau-Ponty's phenomenology of embodied perception, and also in comparison to cinematic 'haunting', as among protagonists and places, in the work of Michelangelo Antonioni and Robert Bresson. This has nothing to do with ghosts, though it will concern the 'haunting' of spaces, places and persons in a different sense.

Brendan Prendeville teaches in the Department of Visual Cultures at Godlsmiths, where heis currently Head of Department. He has published a book on Realism in 20th Century Painting, and articles on philosophy and painting, with particular reference to Merleau-Ponty.

He is working on a book on this subject. An article on the work of Agnes Martin is forthcoming. He has a long-standing interest in the films of Robert Bresson.
