



Slip of the Tongue: writing\architecture with an other voice

I must, to begin with, insist on the following: in the scopic field, the gaze is outside, I am looked at, that is to say, I am a picture.



Slip of the tongue...

I want to start this 'speech' with a slip of the tongue. I am an architect and I want to understand the slip of the tongue in spatial terms. To the physiologist, the slip of the tongue may be a nervous disorder; but to the subject of experience (i.e. to Freud/Lacan) it is a compromise-formation, in which unconscious desire erupts through the taut façade of rational speech and disrupts its close attention to reality. Think of it like the little pebble that drops into the still pond and occludes its otherwise transparent and reflective surface. ...This paper will argue that the inside/outside of architecture - probably architecture's originary relation - colludes in sustaining the illusion of the threshold that polices the psychic interior from reality.
