Take inspiration from these examples of innovative pedagogical approaches to online distance learning:

1. The Open Learning Design Studio MOOC (Open University)

This nine week programme was facilitated by the OU in 2013, in partnership with six other institutions, including the University of Greenwich.

As well as being a good example of institutional collaboration, the course design encouraged social learning through projects and study groups.

2. Open Course in Technology Enhanced Learning (ocTEL) (ALT)

Currently in its second iteration, the ocTEL course employs a connectivist pedagogy. It is based on content produced and shared by learners through a wide range of Web 2.0 platforms.

Dialogue, debate and collaboration are at the heart of the learning experience, and while content and suggested activities are offered on the central course space, learners choose their own learning pathways and strategies.
